Cal, Utah, &c."; 2 with "U.S.S. Cal. Durand & Hilgard"; 1 "U.S.S. Cal. Newberry"; 1 without designation. Nearly all are dated. A significant body of work, detailing the flora of the West as recorded by the great government surveys of the second half of the 19th century, as the nearly tamed frontier was readied for commercial exploitation. Only a few months ago these men, officers of the law, slaughtered in cold blood unarmed and innocent civilians in the street. The Arps are said `to have carried the commission of legally constituted authority in their pockets, refined knavery in their heads and hearts, blood in their eyes, shotguns and revolvers in their hands, and raped the law which they had sworn to execute." Browne was the only shorthand reporter in California at the time, and for his work he

(Howes C241; Wagner-Camp 84) - Superb edition of Catlin's *Letters and Notes on...North American Indians*, first published in 1841, with striking color plates; the first edition had uncolored plates, several editions over the next 30 years had hand-colored plates, but not until 1876 was an edition published with plates printed in color. The present issue, very scarce, is limited to only 75 copies printed on hand-made paper, and is quite lovely. Catlin traveled through the West in the 1830's, painting portraits of Indians & recording their habitats, weapons, rituals, ceremonies, etc., creating during that decade an "Indian Gallery" of great renown. After taking the entire gallery to England, Catlin published his "Letters & Notes," using text from a series of articles he had written for the *New York Commercial Advertiser* from 1832 to 1837, & illustrating it with line-cut reductions of his original paintings. Spines a little sunned with some rubbing, still near fine, but internally fine and clean, exquisite. (2500/3500).

AT THE COLORADO MINES

The Black Hawk Mine, run by Nathaniel Peter Hill, was one of the most successful in Gilpin County, Colorado, and employed smelting techiques which Hill imported from Wales. It seems, however, that Stroehle did not limit himself to

working for the Black Hawk, and his account books are full of notices of work done for other mines and individuals, such as the American Flag M. Co., Bobtail Tunnell Co., Red Elephant M. Co., Pelican Mill in Georgetown (for which he got rail passage and board in addition to payment for fixing their boiler), and many others. The tasks performed include boiler fixing (a lot of that), making ladles, working on buckets, caulking flumes, etc. It appears that the first ledger was also used as a child's arithmetic practice book, after its primary task was over. Joseph Haddox Dorst, at this time serving as a captain in the 4th Cavalry following extensive duty in the Indian Wars, including the Powder River Campaign against the Sioux and Chevenne in 1876-77; Major-General Fitzhugh Lee, a West Point graduate who resigned his commission in 1861 to join the Confederate foces, rose to major-general in the C.S.A., later became governor of Virginia before being appointed U.S. Consul in Havana, in which capacity he served until the outbreak of the was - he was appointed commander of the 7th Army Corps in the conflict; Robert Shufeldt Smith, who enlisted as a private in the New York Infantry, was made major add. paymaster, served Cuba and later the Philippines, eventually rose to colonel in the regular army; Matthew Calbraith Butler, who lost his right leg as a major-general with the Confederacy in the Civil War, later was a Senator from South Carolina before his appointment as major-general of U.S. Volunteers in the Spanish-American War, following which conflict he served on commission assisting Spanish government in evacuating Cuba; and many others. The fifth estate is represented by Richard Harding Davis, journalist and author, who was covering the action for the New York Herald; Charles Mills Sheldon of the Black & White, London (he has drawn a man on a horse next to his inscription); Fletcher G. Ransom of Collier's Weekly (with a sketch of a soldier); James Burton of Harper's Weekly (with a sketch); Fred W. Stowell of the San Francisco Chronicle; Franklin Hall of the Cleveland Plain Dealer; and many others. Also, Also, Wm. Maester, Mayor of Baltimore; Samuel Partello, surgeon with the Red Cross; L. Hoge Tyler, Governor of Virgnia; Fs. de Gallatin, a 1st Lieutenant attached to the staff of General Nuñez of the Cuban Army; W.D. Blixham, Governor of Florida, etc. etc. An important gathering of autographs of persons associated with that splendid little war which saw Teddy Roosevelt ride to fame the Rough Riders; William Randolph Hearst strike gold with "yellow journalism," and the United States acquire colonies in Cuba, the Philippines and Puerto Rico, and perhaps some of the respect it desired from the European powers. These are Owns Heavy Blanket (with a small pictographic sketch); Cecile Short Robe, Crow Feathers (apparently her signature); Yellow Feather, Yellow Head, also known as Weasel Feather but better known as Theodore Last Star (with a small pictographic sketch in addition to the identification); Mike Shortman also known as "Big Mike" (apparently not a signature, just an identification); Little Yellow Man (with his thumb mark); Juniper Oldperson (his signature, with identification as "Judge of the Indian Court); Chief Eagle Calf (giving his sign name of three pictographic symbols, and also with the note that he is "better known as John Ground"); identification of a picture featuring Annie Morning Gun, Night Gun, and Minnie Night Gun (two women and a baby); James White Calf (his signature); Home Gun (with his thumb mark); Chief Owen Heavy Breast (apparently his signature, but with a small pictographic sketch as well); Cut Nose After Buffalo (with his thumb mark); Dog Taking Gun (his signature); Morning Star (apparently her signature); Scalping Woman, who is identified as "Know Generally as Chipping Too Deep Night Street"); Lazy Boy (with his thumb mark); Annie Middle Rider (her signature); Turtle (his signature); a different Lazy Boy (with his thumb mark); Arrow Top (with his thumb mark, and a small sketch, apparently a self portrait); Fish Wolfe Robe (his signature); and Princess Singing in the Clouds, Anna Rita Salvis (her signature). TAKE-OVER OF CALIFORNIA

208. (Stevenson's Regiment) Manuscript letter from U.S. Secretary of War William L. Marcy to John D. Stevenson, authorizing him to raise a regiment of volunteers "to be employed in preventing hostilities in Mexico, probaby in Upper California...." A contemporary fair copy, probably official, of the letter integral to understanding the designs and motives underlying the war between Mexico and the United States which was declared in May, 1846. 1-1/2 pages, on both sides of a single sheet of legal-size paper.

Washington: June 26th, 1846.

Important letter authorizing the raising of Stevenson's Regiment, i.e. the First Regiment of New York Volunteers, instructing them to proceed to California, and revealing certain aspects of their mission there, which was intended to go far beyond merely "preventing hostilities." Indeed, the prospect of occupation and colonization is implied, if not specifically ordered, as indicated by the instructions for selecting the members of the regiment, and mention of their ultimate disposition following the cessation of hostilities. In part: "The President requests and indeed requires that great care should be taken to have it composed of suitable persons. I mean persons of good habits, as far as practicable of various pursuits, and such as would be likely to desire to remain at the end of the war either in Oregon or any territory in that region of the globe which may be then a part of the United States. ...It must be specifically undertood that they may be discharged without a claim for returning home, wherever they may be serving at the termination of the war provided it is in the then territory of the United States... The men must be apprised expressly that their term of service is for the war, that they are to be discharged as above specified, and that they are to be employed on a distant service. It is however very desirable that it should not be publicly known or proclaimed that they are to go to any particular province of Mexico. On this point great caution is enjoined. The communications to the officers and men must go so far as to remove all just ground of complaint that they have been deceived in the nature and place of service.... Very respectfully, Your Obdt. Srvt, W.L. Marcy, Secretary of War." Donald C. Biggs, in Conquer and Colonize (Presidio Press: 1977), quotes the letter in full (exept he oddly leaves out the portion which has been underlined above), and makes the following statement about its import: "This remarkably revealing document was to gain celebrity, to the chagrin of the administration. A letter authorizing a regiment for such a purpose was redolent of an offensive war, not the defensive war claimed by President Polk. Everything was there - the strange selection of men, the unusual terms, the secrecy. This letter revealed even more clearly than the orders to Kearny that the administration was determined on the permanent conquest of California." The volunteers rounded the Horn and arrived in California in the spring of 1847, too late for the conquest, but in ample time to participate in the division of the spoils. Stevenson himself was a Democratic ward politician in New York City, and most of the 917 young men who enlisted were from his home city, in the words of James D. Hart "a motley

group ranging from temperence men through clerks, printers, mechanics, and farmers to hoodlum types, all of whom considered themselves to be adventurers." They arrived by ships in San Francisco in March and April, 1847, too late for military service except for a few companies sent south. They were used in garrison duty until they were disbanded in 1848, at which time, Hart notes, "Stevenson and some other Tammany Hall followers then formed volunteer firefighting companies to serve also as political clubs in aid of David Broderick." Some of the members formed the Regulators, self-appointed vigilantes commonly called Hounds because their program for order consisted of hounding Spanish American and other minorities out of the state. Among the prominent members of the regiment were William G. Marcy, son of the author of this letter; Edward G. Buffum and Edward Gilbert, editors of the *Alta California* newspaper; Rev. Thaddeus Leavenworth, the regimental chaplain and San Francisco's *alcalde* in 1848-49; G.D. Brewerton; Joseph L. Folsom (for a brief time the wealthiest man in California, at least in terms of land ownership); Alfred Sully; Felix Wierzbicki; and other notables who exerted great influence on the commercial, political and social development of California as the years of the Conquest turned into the years of the Gold Rush. The letter exhibits old horizontal creases from being mailed, and there is slight darkening along the creases, otherwise in fine condition, a rare copy of a letter seminal to the understanding of American foreign policy and the its war with Mexico.

Clark, a private in Company D, as the "self-appointed historian of Stevenson's Regiment." Following his discharge in 1848, Clark went to the mines, studied law, and served as justice of the peace in San Joaquin County, returning to New York in 1855. After service in the Civil War, he began compiling this history around 1870. Biggs calls the book "invaluable." There was a 16-page supplement containing additional names of survivors issued in 1883, not present with this copy, indicating it to be one of the earliest issues. The map is bound into the compiled volume for 1836 of *Atkinson's Casket or Gems of Literature*, *Wit and Sentiment*, before the issue for March, 1836, as issued. The map illustrates stories on Texas and Mexico. The Republic of Texas was created by the convention of March, 1836, which declared independence from Mexico, and although the map seems to jump the gun a little, the lettering designating Texas is the same as that designating Mexico and the United States, and it is colored blue. There is slight offset to the map, which is near fine, as is the volume into which it is inserted, which has other engravings, hand-colored fashion plates, etc. It is full leather, spine dec. & lettered in gilt, with some rubbing to the covers.
