Edwards was hanged near the corner next to the road and Snow was hanged on a tree on the next ranch beyond. These three ranches were taken up by men who stayed with Peter Lassen the first winter he was in the valley." Then Fairfield takes us by Dr. Slater's (John Partridge's grandfather) and Manley Thompson's ranch and finalizes the letter with, "All these ranches were quite noted and often spoken of in early days...". In his postscript, he says rather humbly, "On one of the pages...I have written my name. Some people like to have it that done.
